Welcome

Welcome to our Remembrance Service.

This morning we will be remembering the sacrifices made by so many in times of war. We will do this with gratitude and respect, in silence and with music.

We will be thinking about the friendships that can be formed in war time. We will contemplate the courage soldiers need. We will also be considering the roles that hope, peace, faith, prayer and forgiveness play in times of conflict.

Friendship

Jesus said: 'Love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends'.

In World War I Pals battalions or groups of soldiers were formed so that men could fight alongside their friends. This meant though that whole communities lost their men, which was painful.

Many soldiers form very close friendships with their comrades.

Courage

Jesus prayed for courage in Gethsemane. He said: 'not my will, but yours God'.

There are many stories of courage in wartime. Here are a few:





A priest called Geoffrey Studdert Kennedy volunteered as a chaplain on the Western Front during World War I. He was awarded the Military Cross for his courage, running into No Man's Land to help the wounded.

Edith Cavell was a Christian nurse in World War I. She worked in enemy occupied Belgium. She helped 200 allied soldiers to escape. She was put to death for her bravery.

Captain Noel Chavasse was a doctor in World War I. He did medical work all day then went with the stretcher bearers into No Man's Land at night to collect the wounded. He went within 20 metres of the German trenches. He is one of only three people to be given two Victoria Cross medals!

Desmond Doss was a Christian soldier who refused to carry a gun. He rescued 75 men from Hacksaw Ridge in Japan in World War II.



Forgiveness

Jesus said: 'Forgive your enemies and pray for those who persecute you'.



In 1940, during World War II, Coventry Cathedral was bombed. The words 'Father Forgive' were written on the wall behind the altar of the ruined church. These words are prayed every weekday in the new cathedral.

When a war has finished, peace starts with people who are willing to forgive their enemies and let go of bitterness. This can take years of hard work.

Jesus said: 'Peace I live with you, my peace I give to you'.

In every war people long for peace. At the end of a war it takes time to work peace out.

The peace at the end of World War I was signed in a railway carriage in France.

The Paris Peace Treaties following the end of World War II in 1945 were not signed until 1947.

Prayer

The Bible says: 'Pray continually'.

Prayer was a comfort to many soldiers who were frightened and far from home.

Prayer was also a comfort for those left at home. In 1940 when Britain was close to defeat in World War II and the entire British Army was trapped at Dunkirk, King George VI asked people to turn back to God and he declared a National Day of Prayer. Millions of people across the British Isles flocked into churches to pray. There were large queues outside churches and cathedrals as people waited to go inside to pray.

A violent storm arose over the Dunkirk region grounding the Luftwaffe. Then a great calm descended on the which allowed hundreds of tiny boats to sail across and rescue 335,000 soldiers. People referred to what happened as "the miracle of Dunkirk".
